A Powwow was originally a spring event to celebrate the seasonal renewal of new life. Powwows **15 are still held** every weekend, from June until September. In powwows, Native American families compete in singing and dancing.

After the Grand Entry, The Eagle Staff **20** \_\_\_\_\_ to the pole in the center or to the announcer's stand. After the Grand Entry, the singing and dancing can begin.
